**Description**: The goal of this workshop is to equip interpreters to better understand the complex world of mental health interpreting and the unique tools required to confidentially render services.




**Presented by:** Angela Scruggs, Ph.D., LPC/MHSP, NIC, QMHI, has a Doctorate in Psychology and Counseling and is a Licensed Professional Counselor with a Mental Health Specialization designation. Over the past 20 years, Dr. Scruggs' involvement in the deaf and hard of hearing community includes work in the US and abroad. Working in various capacities, she has assisted families and individuals of varying ages, ethnicities, sub-cultural backgrounds, hearing levels, and language preferences, in addressing complex needs. Her primary goal is to empower individuals to achieve their full potential. Angela has also worked in the Deaf community as an interpreter and cultural liaison, educator, assistant behavior specialist, case manager, and a human service specialist with the South Carolina State Department of Mental Health.

Dr. Scruggs worked for nearly 7 years as a mental health therapist at Agape and currently works at Vanderbilt University as project coordinator of a neurocognitive research study with deaf and hard of hearing children. Angela also devotes some of her time as a therapist at Nurture House, a counseling agency specializing in TraumaPlay Therapy.

## Black Interpreters Matter? Show Me a Sign

**Presented by:** Marvette St. Clair has become iconic in presenting, exploring, and exposing the truth publicly about unmentionable race related subjects which are normally only discussed in secret. She holds a Bachelor of Science degree from North Carolina A & T State University and her NIC Advanced certification from the Registry of Interpreters for the Deaf. She took her first sign language class in 1993 which led her to becoming a certified interpreter in private practice, workshop presenter, and trainer. In 2009, Marvette collaborated with the Atlanta Chapter of the National Alliance of Black Interpreters (NAOBI) as Professional Development Chairperson to develop a training program where participants earned RID certifications. Marvette served for 5 years as President of NAOBI-Atlanta January

2012 – December 2016. On the national level, she served NAOBI, Inc. as Treasurer July 2010 – July 2011.
